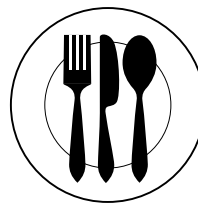

Presidents words:

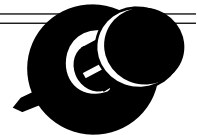

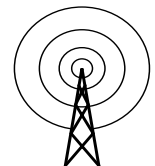

Remembering when

Did you know that for a brief time the MVRC was truly a mobile repeater club ??

The original repeater site on Mt Vaca was on property owned by Crowley Maritime. In exchange for allowing the MVRC to occupy the space, the Club was responsible for maintenance around the Crowley and MVRC sites. This amounted to occasional trips to do some weed control. Then in 1989 Crowley sold the property to a commercial site operator. The rent charged by the new owner was prohibitive and so the MVRC was, for a time, homeless. VHF did continue operating at a temporary location until a fellow ham offered us space on which we could relocate the building. And so it goes that, pulled not by a reindeer but by a big ol' Blazer known as WA6ACF, the building was towed to the new site as the little ol' driver called out "WA6UGY MOBILE."

IRLP/MVRC Internet Radio Linking Project.

So, what does that mean? Simply, IRLP is a way to link repeaters via the Internet. IRLP started over a year ago in Canada and is gaining much popularity here in North America as well as the world.

MVRC is host to the first IRLP repeater in the Sacramento area and the 2nd in Northern CA. MVRC member John N6SEX owns and operates the IRLP repeater and MVRC member Nima WA6SUP owns and operates the IRLP "node" (computer). The system is open and available to anyone -especially MVRC members. The system operates on 1285.850 [-12] MHz with a tone of 100.0. The node # is 301. Repeater and IRLP commands are very simple and available upon request.

Certainly there is a lot of fun to be had on IRLP! It can be used to talk to any of over 200 repeaters (nodes) all over the world. This number is growing very fast and if there is not a node in a city of your choice -it is likely that there will be at least one there very soon. In addition to linking directly to other repeaters, you can use IRLP to link to reflectors (or as I like to call them "chat rooms"). Reflectors are where numerous nodes (repeaters) can all communicate with each other at the same time. While on a reflector you are likely to hear stations from around the world talking real time with one another. It can be great fun!

Some of the best fun that we have had is communicating with traveling MVRC members and other local hams who have stayed in touch via IRLP. The first to do this was Nima WA6SUP who stayed in touch with us while in Denver Colorado. Other examples are Lew WA6ESA and Adrienne WA6CNE who stayed in touch while vacationing in Las Vegas. George W6GWB talked to us from his hand-held while driving a rental car in Washington DC! Most recently Les W6TEE used various nodes to stay in touch with Sacramento while traveling to southern California. Most recently Chris N6ICW kept in touch every evening for a week while up in British Columbia Canada. We sure expect that IRLP will get used in these types of scenarios more and more. Hopefully you will be the next!

For more information on the local node don't hesitate to ask. Many MVRC members including myself and Mike WA6RWR will be happy to help and/or answer your questions.

Operating Guide / Repeater usage

The MVRC repeaters are equipped with 30 second timers in response to the membership's desire that transmissions be short, direct and to the point like face-to-face conversations.

The MVRC system is a large party line that should be kept open for use by as many users as possible. When entering a conversation in progress, identify using your call sign only. The use of the word BREAK is discouraged. Give your call sign in the time period between when one member of the conversation stops transmitting and the courtesy tone occurs.

When the system is being used for Public Service please give that traffic priority.

All Amateurs are welcome to use the open repeaters and in open contacts which do not impede the use by others.

The Mt. Vaca Radio Club, Inc. (MVRC), operates repeater station K6MVR on 2 Meter and 440 MHz., from locations on Mt. Vaca and within the Sacramento area for communications over a wide area. All Amateurs are welcome to use the open repeaters on 147.00 (-) (PL 136.5 Hz.) and in open contacts which do not impede the use by others, except when K6MVR is used for Public Service activity. Club simplex operation for public service and other activities will use 147.585 MHz.

CLUB NET: The MVRC net is every Monday at 7:45 PM on the 147.00 repeater. Club activities are announced. Members, Sponsors, and Visitors are asked to check in.

Members Dues: Membership dues are \$48 per year, due and payable June 1 of each year. (out of area members \$18 per year)

Sponsors: Support for the open repeater. Anyone can become a Sponsor for one year by sending \$15 or more to the Membership Chairman. Sponsors will receive the Mt. Vaca News.

Information on system operation or on membership is available from the Membership Chairman. There is no obligation to become a Sponsor or Member to operate on the open system.
